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Hampton History Museum hosts a witch lecture, Horror Tours this October

Grace Sherwood, the History Behind the Witch Legend October 2, 2023, 7-8 p.m. Hampton History Museum Members free, general attendance \$5

Almost everyone in Coastal Virginia has heard of Grace Sherwood, the Witch of Pungo. People have been sharing stories about her since she was ducked in Lynnhaven Bay during her trial for witchcraft in 1706. This event will reveal the history behind these stories. Using colonial records, including many available in local libraries, this informative discussion will describe the life of Grace Sherwood and her accusers. It'll also help to explain why so many thought she was a witch.

This event is presented by Scott Moore, an associate professor of history at Eastern Connecticut State University. Moore teaches a range of classes on European history, including a course on European folklore. A native of Virginia Beach, he earned a BA from the College of William & Mary; a MA from Old Dominion University; and a PhD from the University of Maryland, College Park. His book, The Witch of Pungo: Grace Sherwood in Virginia History and Legend, will be published by the University of Virginia Press in spring 2024.
